## 1. Getting started

## IMPORTANT

Do not place your CT320 in the bathroom or other humid areas.

## Location

You need to place your CT320 base within 2 metres of the telephone wall socket so that the cable will reach. The socket-outlet should be installed near the equipment and should be easily accessible.

## Connecting the handset and base



1. Plug one end of the handset curly cord into the socket on the side of the base and the other end into the socket at the bottom of the handset.
2. Plug the line cord into the socket marked $\mathcal{f}$ on the back of the base unit.

To listen to your caller.

## 2. Getting to know your phone

## Overview of the base



A Hook switch
Hangs up a call when pressed or when you replace the handset.
B Up
Press to scroll up through the menu.
In standby mode press to open the calls list.
C Menu
Press to open the menu or confirm a menu option.
D Redial
Press to view last number dialled out and continue pressing to scroll through stored numbers.
E Delete
Press to delete an incorrect number or to go back in the menu.

## F Memory

Dial out two-touch memory numbers.
G Short recall
To be used with certain network services.
H Long Recall / Back
To be used with certain network services.
Press to go back to the standy by screen.
I Display
See below for an overview of display icons.

Volume
Press to increase / decrease the volume level.
K M1 Direct dial
Press to store or dial a direct dial number.
L M2 Direct dial
Press to store or dial a direct dial number.
M Hold
Press to put your caller on hold.
N Down
Press to scroll down through the menu.
In standby mode press to open the calls list.
O Hands-free
Activate and deactivate the hands-free during / when making a call.
P Last number redial
Press to redial the last number dialled.

## Display



IN
Indicates when you are viewing the received calls list.
OUT Indicates when you are viewing the redial list.
NEW
Flashes when you have received a new call.
REP Indicates when you have more than 1 missed call from the viewed number.
$\boxed{\text { Indicates when you have a voicemail waiting. }}$

## 3. Using the phone

### 3.1 Calls

### 3.1.1 Make a call

Lift the handset, when you hear the dial tone, dial the number.

### 3.1.2 Pre-dial

1. Enter the phone number (maximum 32 digits). If you make a mistake press $\times$. Lift the handset to dial the number.
2. Press $\mathbb{\square}$ to dial the phone number over hands-free.

## NOTE

You can also make calls using the two touch memory keys, see page 12.

### 3.1.3 End a call

1. Place the handset back on the base.

Or:
2. Press $\square_{\square}^{\infty}$ to end a hands-free call.

### 3.1.4 Receive a call

1. Lift the handset to answer the call.

Or:
2. Press $\square$ to answer the call in hands-free.

## NOTE

If during a call you want to activate hands-free, press $\triangle$ and hang up the handset. To return to the listening via the earpiece, simply lift the handset. You can adjust the volume of a hands-free during the call, press (al), there are 2 levels to choose from.

### 3.2 Hold

You can place your caller on hold so that you and your caller hear hold music.

1. During a call, press (HoD) and you and your caller will hear hold music.
2. Press HoD again to resume your call.

## NOTE

The hold feature does not mute the call, if you speak very loudly you may still be heard.
If you are using the handset and place a caller on hold, you can place the handset on the base and the call remains on hold. When you lift the handset again the call will resume automatically.

### 3.3 Redial

The last entry dialled is stored in the phone; this can be up to 32 digits long.

1. Pick up the handset and press (INR).

Or:
2. Press $\triangle$ and then LNR $^{\square}$.
3. Once the call is answered lift the handset to talk.

### 3.4 Redial list

At least the last 8 entries dialled are stored in the phone, the numbers can be up to 16 digits long.
To dial a number from the Redial list

1. Press (i.
2. Keep pressing (i) to scroll to the entry you want.
3. Press and hold (iti) button for 3 seconds to scroll through the numbers quickly.
4. Lift the handset or press $\triangle$ do dial the displayed entry.

### 3.5 Dial mode

Your phone is set to tone dialling. You should only need to change this if connected to an older type of switchboard / PABX which requires pulse dialling.

1. Press and hold ${ }^{*}$ for 3 seconds to change the setting.

### 3.6 Recall mode

Recall is useful to access certain network services and PABX /switchboard services. Your CT320 has 2 recall buttons (R1) is the short flash time and $\mathbb{R 2}^{R} \uparrow$ is for long flash time.

### 3.7 Turn anti-dialling from an extension on / off

On some PABX's you can set the CT320 to cause interference on the line so another extension cannot be used.

1. Press and hold $\#$ for 3 seconds to change the setting.

## 4. Memory

You can store 10 two-touch memory numbers. You can also store 2 direct dial memory numbers under the M1 and M2. The numbers can be up to 16 digits long.

### 4.1 Store a memory number

1. Dial the number to be stored.
2. Press MENO.
3. Press one of the numbers on the keypad 0-9, $\square$ M1 or M2 the number is stored.

### 4.2 Store a number when the handset is lifted

1. Lift the handset.
2. Press (MENO).
3. Pre dial the number.
4. Press (MENO button.
5. Press one of the numbers on the keypad 0-9,
```
M1
``` stored.

\subsection*{4.3 Store a memory number from the calls list with handset down}
1. Press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to enter calls list.
2. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to required number.
3. Press MENO).
4. Press one of the numbers on the keypad 0-9,
 stored.

\subsection*{4.4 Store a memory number from the calls list with handset is lifted}
1. Lift the handset.
2. Press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to enter calls list.
3. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to required number.
4. Press MENO).
5. Press one of the numbers on the keypad 0-9,
 stored.

\subsection*{4.5 Dial a two-touch memory number}
1. Lift the handset.
2. Press M.
3. Press one of the keypad buttons 0-9.
4. The memory number will be dialled out.

\subsection*{4.6 Dial a two-touch memory number on loudspeaker}
1. Press \(M\).
2. Press one of the keypad buttons 0-9.
3. Press \(\triangle \equiv\).
4. The memory number will be dialled out.

\subsection*{4.7 Dial a direct dial memory number}
1. Lift the handset.
2. Press M1 or M2
3. The memory number will be dialled out.

\subsection*{4.8 Dial a direct dial memory number on loudspeaker}
4. Press M1 or M2.
5. Press \(\triangle\).
6. The memory number will be dialled out.

\section*{NOTE}

Remember to make a note of your memory numbers for easy reference.

\section*{5. Ringtone}

Your CT320 has a choice of 24 ringtones and choose from 4 volume levels and crescendo.

\subsection*{5.1 Set the ringtone}
1. Press HOD. The current ringtone is played.
2. Press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to scroll to the required ringtone. A sample of the ringtone is played.
3. Press \(R 2 \leftarrow\) to confirm and return to standby.

\subsection*{5.2 Set the ringer volume}
1. When the handset is on the base press \(\sqrt{1})\), the display shows ringVOL and the current volume 1-4 or CrESC if crescendo is selected.
2. Keep pressing \(\triangle(1)\) to select the required volume.

\section*{6. Date and time}

If you have subscribed to a FSK type Caller ID Service, the date and time is set automatically when you receive your first call.
If you do not have a FSK Caller ID service, you can set the date and time manually.

\subsection*{6.1 Set the date and time}
1. Press and hold MENU for 3 seconds, the display shows SEt 1 dAtE.
2. Press MENU to select.
3. The year will flash; scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to the correct year and press menv to confirm.
4. Repeat this procedure for the month, day and time settings.
5. Press \(R 2 \leftarrow\) to exit.

\section*{7. Area code}

You can set your local area code into the phone. When a number from that area code calls only the local number will be displayed and stored. If you then redial the number from the calls list while Auto IP is switched on, the Auto IP number will not be dialled.

\subsection*{7.1 Store the area code}
1. Press and hold (MENO for 3 seconds, the display shows SEt 1 dAtE.
2. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to SEt 2 CodE.
3. Press (MENO), the display shows CodE-----.
4. The first - is flashing, press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to scroll to the correct digit.
5. Press MENV) to confirm.
6. Repeat this procedure until the full code is entered.
7. Press \(R 2 \leftarrow\) to exit.

\section*{8. PABX access code}

If the CT320 is connected to a switchboard, you may need to enter a one-digit access code in the dialling sequence to be able to connect to the outside line.
The access code will be displayed at the beginning of a number on the screen.

\subsection*{8.1 Store the PABX access code}
1. Press and hold MeNv for 3 seconds, the display shows SEt 1 dAtE.
2. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to SEt 3 PCOdE.
3. Press MENO, the display shows PCOdE -.
4. The - is flashing, press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to scroll to the correct digit from 0-9.
5. Press MENU to confirm.
6. Press \(R 2 \leftarrow\) to exit.

\section*{9. Auto IP}

Allows you to store your IP code in the phone for lower cost call charges for a long distance call.

\subsection*{9.1 Store a number}
1. Press and hold (MENU for 3 seconds, the display shows SEt 1 dAtE.
2. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to SEt 4 AUTO IP.
3. Press MENU , the display shows AUtO IP OFF.
4. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to On.
5. Press MENU to confirm, the display shows InPUt COdE.
6. Using the keypad enter the IP code, e.g 17909.
7. Press MENU to confirm.
8. Press \(R 2 \leftarrow\) to exit.

\section*{NOTE}

After turning Auto IP on and setting the auto IP number, if a number is pre-dialed and the first digit is \(O\) then the phone will dial out the number and automatically add the Auto IP details.

\section*{10. Display}

You can change the contrast of the display; there are 5 levels to choose from.

\subsection*{10.1 Change the display contrast}
1. Press \(\AA\) R2 \(\uparrow\), the display shows LCD and the current contrast level (1-5).
2. Keep pressing \(\AA\) R \(\leftarrow\) until you see the contrast you require.

\section*{11. Set the alarm}
1. Press and hold (MENO) for 3 seconds, the display shows SEt 1 dAtE.
2. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to SEt 5 ALErt.
3. Press MENO and the display shows 00-00 OFF.
4. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\wedge}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to set the first digit and MENO to confirm.
5. Repeat this procedure until all digits are correct.
6. Scroll \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to On.
7. Press \(\AA 2 \leftarrow\) to exit.

\section*{NOTE}

To stop the alarm press any key or lift the handset. The alarm will stop automatically after 30 seconds if no button is pressed. If at the alarm time the phone is ringing, the handset is lifted or the phone is in use the alarm will be cancelled.

\section*{12. Calls lists}

If you have subscribed to a Caller ID service, and provided the identity of the caller is not withheld, the number of the caller will be displayed together with the date and time of the call (if provided by the network). When the list is full and a new call is received, the oldest entry will be deleted automatically. You can store at least 32 numbers in the received calls list and each number can be up to 16 digits long.

\section*{NOTE}

If you receive a private call ---P--- will show on the display.
If you receive an out of area call ---0--- will show on the display.
If you receive an error call ---E--- will show on the display.

\subsection*{12.1 Enter the Received calls list}
1. Press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to enter the Received calls list.
2. Keep pressing to scroll through the list.
3. The display will show --End-- when you reach the end of the list.

\subsection*{12.2 Dial a number from the Received calls list}
1. Press \(\boldsymbol{\Delta}\) or \(\boldsymbol{\nabla}\) to enter the Received calls list.
2. Keep pressing to scroll to the number you want to dial.
3. Either lift the handset to dial automatically, or press \(\triangle\) ब \(\triangle\) to dial over handsfree.

\subsection*{12.3 Enter the Redial list}

The least the last 8 entries dialled are stored in the phone; these can be up to 32 digits long.
1. Press (田) to enter the Redial list.
2. Keep pressing to scroll through the list.

\subsection*{12.4 Dial a number from the Redial list}
1. Press (1).
2. Keep pressing (\$) to scroll to the entry you want.
3. Lift the handset to dial the number automatically or press \(\triangle\) al dial the displayed entry over hands-free.

\section*{NOTE}

If you have received a new call NEW, will display.
If you have more than one missed call from the same number REP , will show on the display.

\section*{13. Help}

\section*{No dial tone}
- Use only the telephone line cord supplied.
- Check that the telephone line cord is connected properly.

\section*{Storing numbers}
- Once you have stored a number there is no confirmation tone.
- A number cannot be deleted once stored, you can overwrite it with a new number.

\section*{Memory numbers}
- Please remember to make a record of your two touch memory numbers.

\section*{14. General information}
